Some have actually bought new merchandise and donated it to the CCVFD to auction off.

The Cal/Fire Fire Crew from the Trinity River Conservation Camp that came and dug out our fire hydrants impressed me and made me want to know more about them. These men are sent into places that a fire truck or a bull dozer cannot make it to. They do the “grunt work” by cutting fire breaks and cleaning up after the fire is put out. My son has been a firefighter for 20 years and is a Battalion Chief. He said he if he had a choice he would choose the Cal/Fire Fire Crew to join his crews to help put out fires every time.

These inmates do much more than fight fires. They rehabilitate burned areas and clear away fire fuel in the forests. They also do a variety of community work projects such as: clean up graffiti, clean road sides, paint fences, etc.

The Trinity River Conservation Camp opened more that 15 years ago. The facility is under the direction of the High Desert Correctional Facility in Susanville, and is managed by the California Department of Forestry and Fire protection, and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. There are 22 camps state wide that can have up to 120 inmates. None of the inmates have committed crimes that involve rape, molestation, or violence of any kind.

The 2005-2006 Trinity County Grand Jury investigated the Trinity River Conservation Camp. They found that the “camp is a well maintained minimum security facility providing basic skill training for inmates in the last 24 months of their sentence. Besides firefighting skills, the training these men receive includes learning how to raise vegetables and flowers, prepare and serve meals, and run the fire-fighter mobile kitchen. They work in the auto repair and are keeping the machinery in well—maintained and working conditions ...”

They are available for work for any government agency, county, city, state or federal project. The crews work a full day at a cost of \$200. The fee covers 17 workers, one supervisor and the necessary equipment”. We are lucky to have them, and it is a fantastic way for the inmates to learn new job skills, making their transition back into society much easier.

The Trinity Center/Coffee Creek Red Cross DAT has set a permanent monthly date as the first Thursday of the month. The next meeting to be held at the Eyman house will be March 6.

The “Pot Party” will continue to meet the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month. We are now working with “Slab Construction”. There is still plenty of room for any new-comers. You may be interested in one technique and not the others. That’s okay with us. Just come and enjoy our wonderful group.

TC Community Service District Board has changed their meeting date to the 1st Tuesday of each month at 7:30 at the IOOF Hall. Come and join them. There is plenty of seats and hot coffee ... sometimes there is also cookies.
